**READ: Book Club (for the 4 week period)**: So, You Want To Talk About Race by Ijeoma Oluo. Read chapters 9-12 this week.

In So You Want to Talk About Race, Ijeoma Oluo guides readers of all races through subjects ranging from intersectionality and affirmative action to "model minorities" in an attempt to make the seemingly impossible possible: honest conversations about race and racism, and how they infect almost every aspect of American life.

READ: Letter from a Birmingham Jail (about 20 min)

From the Birmingham jail, where he was imprisoned as a participant in nonviolent demonstrations against segregation, Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., wrote in longhand this letter. It was his response to a public statement of concern and caution issued by eight white religious leaders of the South. Written on April 16, 1963.


